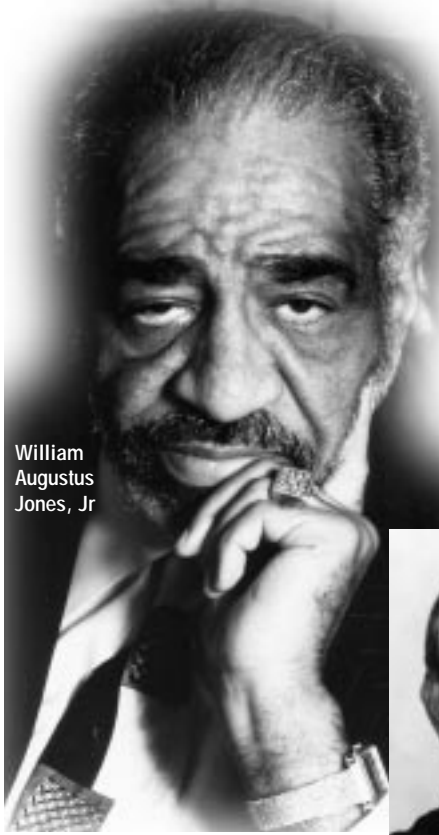

from the Moderator

Where Baptist Stills Means Freedom

Baptists were born out of a desire for freedom—freedom from persecution, freedom from state control, and freedom of religion. In this country, being Baptist meant you were fighting for a cause, usually involving the freedom to believe or worship the way you felt was best. We have been diverse, and we have cherished our freedom.

In his book *A History of the Baptists*, Robert Torbet states: "The people called Baptists have their roots within what may be called the Free Church movement, which found variant expression throughout the history of Christianity. Although the term cannot be defined strictly, it is useful to describe the effort of Christians of varying theological beliefs and ecclesiastical backgrounds to restore the New Testament emphasis upon a Spirit-filled community of faith. In essence, the Free Church ideal stressed the necessity of a person-to-person confrontation with God, and so placed only secondary emphasis upon liturgy formalism, organization and creedalism in its hardened form."

January through March is without a doubt the busiest time of the year for us. We are getting ready for the March meeting in Augusta. It will prove to be a wonderful time. Our speakers are excellent and the breakout sessions are shaping up to be very interesting.

The Education, Fellowship, Missions and Partnership Avenues that help govern our work have been meeting, preparing budget requests for the coming year. We are likely to see a significant increase in the budget because we are moving toward hiring a Missions Coordinator.

Peachtree Baptist Church ends support of SBC and GBC

Atlanta's oldest Southern Baptist affiliated church will now fulfill its missionary calling by working with the CBF and the CBF of Georgia. Peachtree Baptist Church has officially severed its ties to the Southern Baptist Convention and Georgia Baptist Convention by completely de-funding the SBC and the GBC from the church budget. Actions were taken in church conference on Wednesday, November 15, 2000.

The church, which was founded in 1847, cites doctrinal differences with the SBC and GBC as the root cause of this action. The revisions to the Baptist Faith and Message, which has traditionally been held as a confession

of common beliefs among Baptists, has not been well received by this historic congregation.

Key problematic issues cited by the church include:

- The elevation of Scripture over Jesus Christ as supreme revelation of God
- The elimination of Jesus Christ as the criterion by which to interpret Scripture
- The betrayal of local church autonomy
- The undermining of the doctrine of the "priesthood of all believers"
- The couched denial of God's sovereignty
- The proposed use of the new Baptist Faith and Message as a creedal standard to which all SBC employees, missionaries, and trustees must subscribe

Peachtree Baptist Church members have been displeased with the fundamentalist leadership of the convention since that group took power in 1979. Peachtree Baptist Church was represented at the formation of the CBF in Atlanta in 1991 and has contributed to that organization since its inception. The church, which has been supporting missions through the SBC and CBF, will now support only CBF Global Missions, CBF of Georgia, and local causes with its missions dollars.

The church believes the SBC mission agencies, which have well over \$600 million dollars in reserve funds, will not be adversely affected by their decision.

It is thought that Peachtree Baptist Church is the first Atlanta church to withdraw from the SBC following similar moves by the First Baptist Church of Savannah last month and First Baptist Church of Athens earlier in the year. While the church had been prayerfully considering withdrawing support from the SBC for several

months, the decision to also end support of the GBC was made as a result of that group's decision to adopt the revised Baptist Faith and Message at their annual meeting in Savannah. Peachtree Baptist Church is the first GBC related church to end its support of the GBC over these issues. Peachtree was noted for another first in 1996 when it ordained the Rev. Harriett Tucker Watkins to the Gospel ministry. Rev. Watkins was the first African-American woman to be ordained by a SBC related church.

Pastor Robert Walker says, "While the severing of such historic ties is painful, it is also freeing. The SBC's public moral grandstanding, intolerance, and fundamentalist leadership have embarrassed many of our members in recent years. It is now obvious that the same theologically narrow mind set that forever changed the SBC beginning in 1979 has now metastasized in the GBC where the fundamentalists have seized control. It is important to note that this separation is not the result of any change in theology at Peachtree Baptist Church, rather we believe that the SBC and now the GBC have moved so far away from their traditional core beliefs that we can no longer support them. I can now feel good again about who we are as Baptists, Cooperative Baptist Fellowship Baptists, that is."

Jimmy Carter renounces Southern Baptist ties

Former President Jimmy Carter speaks out about Christian Index treatment of CBF of Georgia

Carter told Associated Baptist Press the recent decision by directors of the Christian Index, the Georgia Baptist newspaper, to restrict articles and ads promoting the Cooperative Baptist

Fellowship, "is improper and a violation of freedom of press."

"The fact is that almost every one in Georgia who gives money to CBF is also giving to the Georgia Baptist Convention. And the Christian Index is supposed to represent all Georgia Baptists."

"I don't like that at all," he continued. "That's just a forerunner of things that are pending and just a further imposition of the creed...."

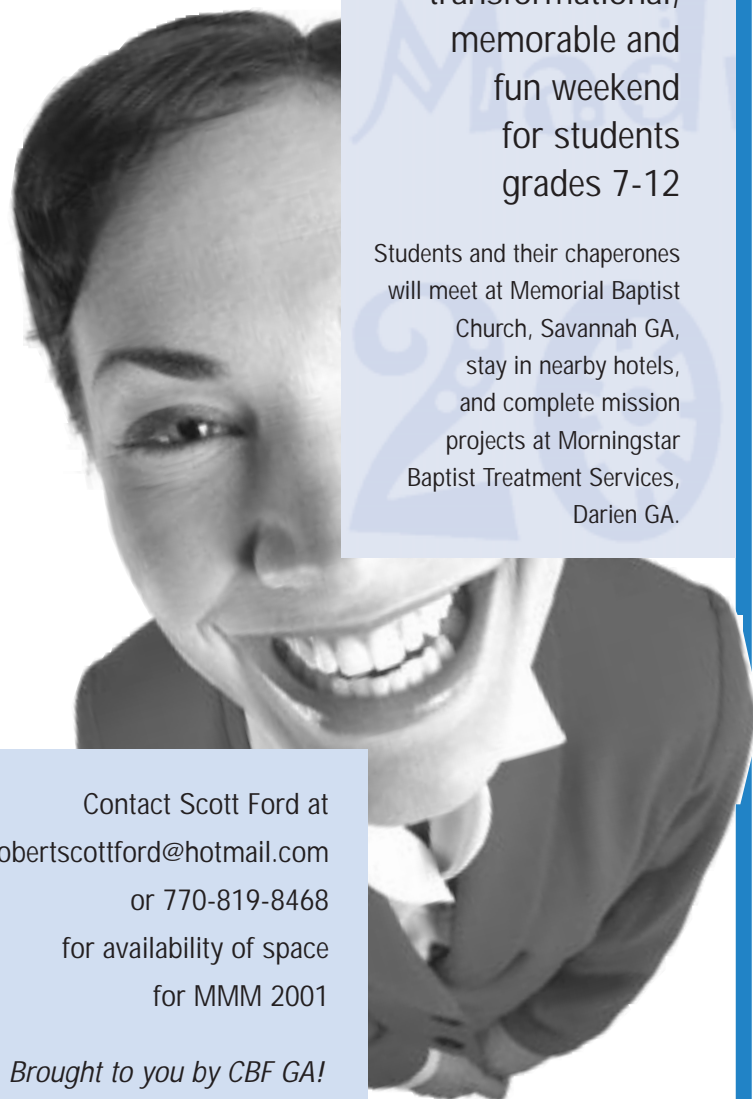

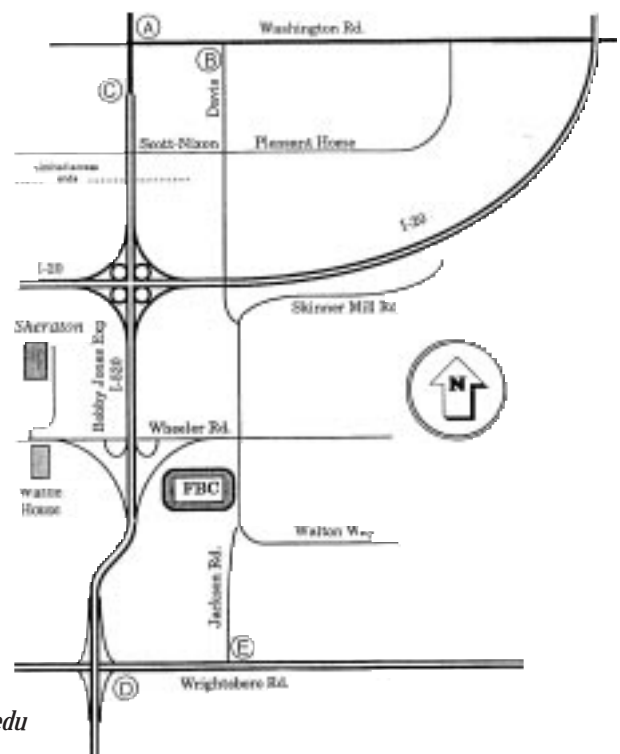
