Frankly speaking

As your coordinator I am responsible for helping the various avenues and their committees function. Let me give you an update on the work of some of these.

Moderator-elect Becky Matheny is chair of the **Convocations** Committee. The members have planned the fall meeting in Macon and are working on the spring meeting in Decatur. The committee is even looking ahead to the fall of 2000 in Savannah and the spring of 2001 in Augusta. You will be pleased with their plans.

Mary Etta Sanders is chair of the **Education** Avenue. They have been busy addressing such issues as New Horizons Camp for children and March Missions Madness for youth. They also have responsibility for directing scholarship funds we award to students at Mercer University McAfee School of Theology and Candler School of Theology at Emory University, and for providing educational resources for local churches.

Joy Carter is chair of the **Missions/Ministry** Avenue. This committee is working on such issues as new church starts, mission trips, and support for Morningstar Baptist Treatment Services and the Chamblee-Doraville Ministry Center.

Caroline Galloway chairs the **Fellowship** Avenue. At the present moment it has one main responsibility. The committee is planning the Georgia fellowship meeting in Orlando at the 2000 National CBF General Assembly. Additional responsibilities for this Avenue will come as we develop the regional aspects of our work.

Joel Richardson chairs the **Partnership** Avenue. This committee has determined a procedure for churches that choose to be listed on our webpage. They will also keep a current list of our partnering organizations. Requests for support from partner organizations are channeled through the Partnership Committee.

Jim Ross is chair of the **Finance** Committee. The four avenue chairs mentioned above serve on this committee, along with the Executive Committee. We will work during the fall and present a proposed budget to the Coordinating

Council in January of 2000. The Coordinating Council responds to what is given and presents a budget to the General Assembly at the spring meeting.

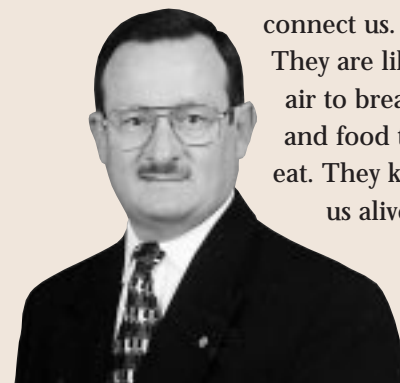

There is something about relationships. They nurture, sustain, encourage, enhance, and connect us. They are like air to breathe and food to eat. They keep us alive.



They help us see ourselves and others. They give us identity, and that is very important in a day and age when so many are not sure of who they are or where they are going, or even when someone else may be trying to tell them who they are and where they should be going.

The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship is about relationships. Relationships

are fluid. They change. They expand. They are characterized by their ability to modify and adjust. They are alive; though often full and rich, they can be strained and stretched—and sometimes misunderstood. They never seem to be complete, because they are constantly growing. They can grow together or they can grow apart, but they grow.

The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship is about relationships. Relationships are free. They are not forced. They are open. They allow us room—room to search, question, affirm, doubt, reject, mess up, cry, be angry, celebrate, start over. They are rooted in acceptance, respect, trust, and hope. They are there in the good, bad and ugly. They let us be who we have

been, who we are, and who we are becoming. They don't require us to be exactly the same. They permit that, but they are aware that opposites can attract for mutual benefit.

The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship is about relationships. Relationships are about sharing. They don't depend on completeness. They don't require complete knowl-

edge or understanding. They happen amidst incompleteness. They happen very much like the process of putting together an airplane as it is actually flying. Friends don't know everything. Spouses don't know everything. They take a chance, a leap of faith.

The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship is about relationships. A lot of Baptist

Christians do not understand relationships. They are too loose for some. Some folks want firmness, fixture, rules, sharp definitions. They want a bottom line connection with no room for variables. Their idea is that God has made us all alike. Their idea is that they have all the answers; everything is figured out and clearly defined. They have it, whatever it is. And those

who don't have it irrevocably fixed are...well, lost. They are more about rules than relationships.

I think God is more interested in relationships than rules. The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship is about relationships.
