Money and Laundry

In recent years the August issue of *Visions* has been dedicated to reporting on finances. This is a matter of accountability for us. It is not always the most popular issue we publish. Few people ever call me up and say, "What a great issue!" They do that on all other issues, but not usually this one. I suspect it is because we moderates don't like to talk about money so much, officially that is. We do it in the hallway or parking lot, but the thought of doing it in a worship setting or even in a newsletter is just not our thing. It makes me think of the time when most people in the country had clothes lines. They were almost never in the front of the house, maybe on the side, usually in the back. We didn't like airing even our clean laundry in public. It was simply a part of our culture. Money and laundry were off limits.



Maybe it is still better to keep the laundry in the back of the house, but not so with money. Reporting on what we have received and how it was spent is an essential part of our responsibility as stewards of what God has provided. Baptists have, generally speaking, believed in an open Bible and an open ledger. That is because we have trusted the body when it comes to theology and when it comes to financial support. I would argue that this is not a coincidence. After all, what you know and believe should inform and direct how you act.

So what does our financial report look like from June 2006 through May 2007? The short answer is that it is a mixed

bag. We ended the year in the black by a couple of thousand dollars. However, that is because we were one staff member short for most of the year. Had we been fully staffed, we would have been in a deficit situation. From a budget perspective we ended the year more than \$130,000 behind the budget. From an income perspective we ended the year \$64,300 behind last year. This is the first decline in receipts we have experienced over the previous year in the last decade. In 2005/2006 we ended the year \$13,000 behind budget,

but our income was about the same as the year before. Not so this year. On one level we should rejoice that we have gone so long without a decline. Most every non-profit organization has seen some decline in recent years, especially if one factors inflation into the equation. On another level we should feel some measure of concern. This may be an indication that our churches are not doing as well as they once did. What is happening on the demographic scene in most of our county seat towns does not favor our churches. It may also indicate that churches are changing the way they think about missions. Expenditures on the local scene are up, especially for the larger churches, while state and national giving remains the same or is in decline. This is not only true for us but for most other church groups as well.

I find it interesting that while these trends are underway the expectations of organizations like CBF/GA are up. We have more participation in our events than ever. The spring or fall assemblies may be up or down depending on location and speaker, but for the most part all of our other events, programs, and ministries are on the rise. We have more kids at March Mission Madness than ever, more scholarship requests, more peer learning groups, more requests for assistance for reference and referral, more involvement in disaster relief, a vibrant CBF/GA youth choir retreat, and a growing CBF/GA adult choir. We are involved in two new African American church starts, one new Hispanic church ministry, and one new Anglo church restart. Devita and I have been in more churches and participated in more conferences than in any previous year. We have expanded our involvement with our partner organizations. We have doubled our communications ability with an expanded *Visions*, an electronic newsletter we call *Re-Visions*, and a completely revamped and expanded web presence.

The challenge we face is the same challenge faced by most denomination-like organizations. We are in a changing ecclesiastical culture. Some call it post-modern, some post-denominational, some say post-Christian. Most of us grew up in a church culture where strong and healthy congregations were called to serve the weaker and fragile ones. Churches banded together to share their resources so that the world as a whole would benefit. The demands placed on local congregations have tempered the flow of resources to mission organizations. Of course I am not very objective about this. After all I passionately believe in what we are doing. I also believe that our partner congregations and those individuals who support our work will meet the challenge of this new day. CBF/GA

An article on “Trends in Giving” sounds just like what we need for our churches, doesn’t it? If we knew what the trends are, then we would act, right? Unfortunately, that has not been my experience. Knowledge of the trends has not led to the changes needed to bring about different results.

The one big trend in most of the churches I interact with is that “budget” giving is flat when compared with inflation, year after year after year. There is little or no increase in ministry purchasing power.

The second trend is that senior members who give generously and perhaps the largest portion of annual gifts do not have an unlimited life expectancy; we are saying goodbye on a regular basis to members of the greatest generation.

The third trend is that most of our churches are wedded to the budget-driven model of stewardship that developed in the 1950’s, and they are fearful of letting go of the familiar. Stewardship is budget-driven rather than mission-inspired.

So, let me attempt to fulfill my assignment regarding trends in giving by offering **a vision of the trends we SHOULD be experiencing** in our congregations, in a spirit of power and love and self control (2 Timothy 1:7).

1. We are facing and overcoming our fears associated with money so that personal finances, spending, and giving are not taboo subjects.

2. We are preaching, studying, and acting on the whole counsel of God, including those texts that mention generosity, possessions, greed, and contentment.
3. Clergy and lay leaders are modeling Christian lifestyles that are unburdened by stuff and consumer debt.
4. We are learning and applying Christian money management principles and strategies and talking about our experiences with one another.
5. We are less obsessive about meeting a budget and much more interested in fulfilling our mission (the real stewardship).
6. Our generosity is extending in ever increasing ways beyond our congregation.
7. We are asking for and receiving current major gifts and estate gifts in proportion to members’ wealth.

This vision of trends we should be experiencing is based upon a belief in the abundance provided by God. For too long and by too many, we have acted on a belief in scarcity of resources. God has not just been generous to us; God has been extravagant! God is providing us with every grace gift in abundance, that being content with enough, we will have more than enough for every good work (2 Corinthians 9:8, paraphrase mine). CBF/GA

for study in the Master of Divinity program, and several local churches, the Moldovan congregation, CBF/GA, GBC, and the Stone Mountain Baptist Association all agreed to support the financial requirements placed on someone with a student visa.

The past two years have been educational, to say the least. Igor testifies himself that his mind has truly been opened to God's greatness as he has studied at McAfee. Igor has also been educated on what is involved in being a pastor and a full-time student. The Moldovan church has also been educated, as they

work with Igor in his first pastorate and as they learn to work with our congregation. Our church has also been educated as we have sought to mentor Igor and to mentor this fledgling congregation.

When Igor began his ministry with the Conyers church, he had fifteen people present for his first meeting. Now, just two and a half years later, they have forty regular attendees and have actually begun reaching English speaking people as well! To say that Igor and his family have been a blessing to Conyers, to Trinity Baptist Church, and to me, Trinity's pastor, would be an understatement. God has blessed us beyond measure. CBF/GA

Our Financial Health

The August/September issue of *Visions* has become the primary means through which we report on the financial health of CBF/GA. We currently have 133 churches and 184 individuals relating to us either by giving to the budget or by participating in CBF/GA projects or events. Currently there are 26 other Georgia churches that give only to CBF/National.



Last fiscal year (June 1, 2006 through May 31, 2007) we fell short of meeting budget by \$130,900. Total budget receipts were \$567,500. The good news is that we did not spend more than we took in. Total budget spending was \$547,000. Budget giving is down \$64,300 over last fiscal year and designated giving is down by \$11,800.

Because of the decline in giving I thought this year we would show giving trends over the past four years. Referencing the chart below, total budget giving increased 22% from 2004 to 2005 but basically stayed the same from 2005 to 2006. Last year we were down 10.2%.

In the very near future CBF/GA will have the option of making contributions online. We are very excited about this new process.
